# The Fate of Lane County Animal Services

As struggling families relinquish more pets to shelters due to the ever-increasing costs of pet care or are evicted from their homes and cannot find pet-friendly rental housing, funding comprehensive animal services becomes more important than ever. Unfortunately, our local government is planning to make significant cuts to the essential services provided by Lane County Animal Services (LCAS). Charitable giving is on the decline, meaning smaller local rescue groups (like S.A.R.A.) have to do more with less and are unable to take on all of the additional burden that these funding cuts demand. As city officials decide how to strip down and reorganize animal services to the point of ineffectiveness, the reality is that the local animal population will suffer, and unwanted dogs and cats will pay the ultimate price.

Budget shortfalls for the upcoming fiscal year have placed LCAS on the chopping block. Currently, LCAS is funded jointly through the City of Eugene and Lane County, with a small amount provided by the City of Springfield. The Eugene City Manager and City Council insist that due to these budget cuts, LCAS is no longer sustainable. They are planning to replace it with a new model (theoretically, a private organization that would individually contract with Eugene, Lane County, and Springfield) that would be able to take over housing and adoption services for less money than these services currently cost. Animal enforcement and licensing would be transferred to the jurisdiction of local police.

Officials for Lane County and the City of Eugene have been moving through this process at an incredible speed, making the announcement of the intent to dismantle LCAS the end of February and insisting that a new model will be in place by July of this year. Despite pleas by S.A.R.A. and others concerned with animal welfare to slow down and give this transitional period the time and planning it deserves, neither the County nor the City have taken these requests seriously.

Answers to even the most basic questions are hard to come by: *Specifically, how can the same quality of animal services be provided for less money by de-centralizing agencies? How can the same quality of service be provided at all, considering the new models will be operating with \$1,400,000 less than this fiscal year? How will adjustments be made if the new model proves to be inadequate at maintaining low euthanasia rates? How can animal enforcement function as an entity separate from housing and adoption services? Who will make the decisions regarding whether to impound an animal or ignore it? Or to answer an abuse/neglect/dangerous dog call?* S.A.R.A. representatives have been at all recent City Council, City Budget, and County Commissioners meetings, as well as additional meetings set up to specifically address animal services, but no answers have been provided and no plan is yet in place.

This dismantling will, without a doubt, undo nearly a decade's worth of hard work. Rescue organizations (S.A.R.A. included) and community members are responsible for transforming LCAS from a 'catch and kill'

facility to a progressive, low-kill shelter with an increased focus on adoption. Since 2001, task forces have been hard at work helping to implement programs that have dramatically reduced the number of animals euthanized each year.

City and County officials have stated their commitment to maintaining LCAS's current low euthanasia rate, but are unclear on the specifics of how this would be accomplished or who would be responsible for providing oversight. There are no animal welfare advocates included in the 'tri-agency transitional team' in charge of creating the new model. It's obvious that the team charged with dismantling LCAS views this process as merely a budgetary concern.

Creating an entire complex system of animal control is not something that can be done quickly or haphazardly. Despite input and offers to help from knowledgeable community members, the City and County refuse to accept that this decision will have serious ramifications. It has taken eleven years for concerned Eugene citizens to transform LCAS into the low-kill shelter that it is today, and to eliminate LCAS will not only erase years of hard work, but also increase future costs to the city and put additional animals (and people) at risk.

This lack of knowledge regarding animal care and a total absence of community involvement is alarming. Making this process as secretive as possible does not fit with the transparency that should be required of our city, our county, and any contracting organizations.

Most people couldn't imagine living in a community with no school, no hospital, no police, no road maintenance. An animal shelter, too, is a community institution, and shouldn't be allowed to go under. It's obvious to everyone that we're in tough financial times, but the city and county need to understand that cutting animal services is not the answer. The staff and volunteers at S.A.R.A. will continue to monitor the situation closely and demand that the people and organizations that have made such important reforms are not excluded from this process. Innocent cats and dogs should not be exposed to more suffering all in the name of saving a few bucks.

## How You Can Help Lane County Animals:

- Continue to support S.A.R.A. as we monitor the way the Cities of Eugene and Springfield and Lane County handle this transition.
- Make your voices heard: Talk to your representatives on the Lane County Board of Commissioners and City Council. Let them know that progressive Animal Services are important to you and your community.

# Adaleen and 8 Hungry Kittens

Living outside in October with no sight or mobility, your only protection coming from your mother, who has 7 other mouths to feed and protect. This was the story of Tancy, Adaleen (her mother), and 7 other siblings. Luckily, a good Samaritan saw a cat carrying 1-week-old kittens through her back yard one and a time, leaving them in the shelter of a bush in the rain and came to their rescue. S.A.R.A. accepted this large family into our rescue program and immediately started helping Adaleen nourish her kittens (staff supplementally bottle fed the kittens since it's a lot to ask one mom to feed 8 mouths) and rid them of all their parasites from the street life. S.A.R.A. supplied kitten formula, tons high quality kitten food for mom and her kittens, litter, toys, cat trees, and tons of love and affection so these special guys would know they would never have to fend for themselves again. Of course, the kittens grew like weeds...and turned into 8 tiny models of mom (*we have never have had a litter where everyone looked so much alike!*)!

Once Adaleen's kittens were old enough to be weaned, (a full 12 weeks at S.A.R.A.'s in order to ensure proper socialization and healthy immune systems) she was finally able to be spayed. She also required a dental cleaning with many teeth extractions—all those years on the street were hard for this little gal! Now that she is healthy, free of parasites, and feeling good, she is able to think about herself, having to raise kittens or worry where her next meal is going to come from. Adaleen is gaining confidence and learning about the luxuries of being an indoor kitty—catnip, treats, and having a warm, soft place to sleep. After the kittens were spayed and neutered, they were put up for adoption in S.A.R.A.'s Treasures. J.J., Roman, and Grant have already found their forever homes and are thriving! Tancy, Bill, Wanda, Margene, and Adaleen are still waiting for forever homes.

Stop in soon to see all of our hard work, and don't forget to pet me while you're here.


